Mission Committee Report

The Mission Committee has had a busy year — that may not adequately sum it up, but it is pretty close. We have experienced a rebirth in the past year. We have taken on new partnerships, we have seen new opportunities open to us, and we have seen JAPC's mission outreach grow in ways we did not think possible. It's hard to predict what will come next. We have had multiple conversations with varying groups interested in what we are doing and how they may partner with us. I would like to mention a few of our partners and how they have directly impacted our work.

Danielle Todd

Danielle has been instrumental in our mission and views us as a partner in so many ventures. It is hard to believe that a year ago she was trying to figure out the logistics for the Thanksgiving Dinner 2020. It was hard to imagine how it would be pulled off, but I remember thinking about a week before it actually happened, "she's got this!" 1,000 bags containing complete chef made dinners were distributed on the Wednesday before Thanksgiving and our church's role in it did not go unrecognized. It did not conclude there. Two months later, three chefs were working in our kitchen at JAPC to produce 50 meals weekly. As the funding increased, so did the number of meals. As 2021 went on, we were producing 175 meals per week. During **Advent** — new beginnings and possibilities, we know that many things will happen when you are open to think in new ways.

Alberta Asmar

Alberta contacted the church in mid-February of this year. I happened to be in the office and Margie handed me the phone. Alberta explained her work with Harbortown Market and how we might be a distribution point for her reclaimed groceries ministry. We are blessed to be able to get food into the hands of folks that need it. Alberta has supplied us with a variety of food and perishable items that we distribute weekly. One week, she asked if I thought adult undergarments might be distributed. I turned 50 shades of red but said we would try. They were very well received and have become one of our most sought-after items that we distribute. It seems God uses us in ways we don't think possible or necessary. Although no one likes to talk about such items, they are a significant expense for budgets that may already be stretched in ways we never thought possible. It is one more example how a partnership has allowed us to help those struggling in the 48214 zip code.

Kristi Lewis

Kristi is one of our many partner volunteers. There are countless names I could mention but Kristi is one of our longest serving volunteers. She was at the Thanksgiving preparations, has driven the *Make Food Not Waste* van to do pickups, and shows up weekly to help distribute. Kristi truly exemplifies servant leadership. Through the various stages of parking lot heat, windstorms, rain deluges, and bitter temperatures, she has been there helping our guests and taking care of their needs. When Kristi arrives, she always says, "what do you need?" and immediately pitches in to help. Her dedication to our mission has been ongoing for many years and as it changes, Kristi steps in where needed. Byrum Patrick, Chelsea Gilbert, Sally Owens, and countless others have joined in our commitment to food distribution and to seeing that folks are well taken care of when they come through our gates.

The Journalists

The press often gets a bad rap, but they have been very generous with JAPC this year and our efforts have not gone unnoticed. Planet Detroit, Detroit Free Press, National Geographic, and Presbyterians Today are just of few of the newspapers and periodicals where our church's ministry has been mentioned, highlighted, and recognized. Recognition is good but it is fleeting. The real work is just starting. As you read this, we probably have our second Thanksgiving dinner in the rearview mirror. It will be a much smaller outreach this year and will be more targeted towards those that drive in weekly to get food. After countless articles about what churches are not doing and how churches are failing, it is nice to know that we have been recognized for our efforts and that our willingness to partner with other groups has not gone unnoticed.

Many of our programs started in the past few years continue to flourish. Bags of food that are packed for students at Nichols School. Sandra Nichols and Laura Boyle shop, bag, and keep a watchful eye on the backdoor pantry. Louis Asmus delivers our 30 bags to Nichols every week. Sandra and Laura also sort the items we receive from Harbortown making sure our guests receive quality items. *The Angel Tree* party, coordinated by Pat Slone, continues assuring that children of incarcerated parents have something under the tree. Five kitchen angels plus one gave our kitchen a much needed thorough cleaning! This list could go one for several more paragraphs, but I will stop.

Advent signals a rebirth and a new beginning. Our Mission Committee's work is not finished but truly has had some rather fast starts this past year. Please join with us this **Advent** as we prayerfully seek our next steps and reach out for new partners for JAPC. Join us as we look for other ways to serve Christ from the corner of Burns and Jefferson.

Music Series 2021-22

The '20-'21 information about the series was released in November. By the time you read this, we will have already hosted Nicholas Schmelter and Tyler Kivel in their "Dual Art" program for organ and piano. The series this year includes a number of personal connections for me so it will feature the organ a lot this year!

In June, I will be putting on a "Steve and Friends" style concert celebrating the 100th anniversary of the passing of Camille Saint-Saens. I will perform a few of his original organ compositions along with a few transcriptions of favorite symphonic works like *Dance Macabre*. We will also feature my classmate, Christine Westbury, on piano with the first movement of the *Egyptian* piano concerto. Saint-Saens lived a very long and interesting life. He was well travelled and educated in science. Like Charles-Marie Widor, he outlived the fashion of his own compositions, but was always a vital part of the Parisian musical culture. The program will give us a chance to enjoy the now timeless beauty of his melodies and sparkle in his musical settings.

On March 27, we will feature my professor from the University of Michigan, Dr. James Kibbie, in a solo organ concert. Dr.

Kibbie is the chair of the organ department and has been on the faculty at U of M since the early 1980s. He has won several prestigious performance compositions including the famed Chartes Competition and the Prague Spring Festival. In the early 2000, Dr. Kibbie undertook a project to perform the complete Bach organ works in 18 recitals. He recorded the complete catalogue on historic organs in Germany and has made them all available for free download. I am pleased to have the chance to feature my mentor this year.

We are also trying something different this year by featuring artists during worship. Jackson and Almeda Berkey have been great friends to our worship program. On December 12, will be bringing them back to do an **Advent** service with our chancel choir. Instead of one cantata, we are creating a service with a few of his shorter works. The centerpiece will be his new setting of the text *O Magnum Mysterium*. This text points to all the animals surrounding Christ in the Manger and invites the theme of the "peaceable kingdom" to be explored in the service. This piece and others will feature a small ensemble of strings, woodwinds, percussion, harp and organ. We are excited to have a chance to collaborate with the Berkey's again and have a chance to share their great work in ministry!

Carillon practice keyboard among choir room treasures

The beautiful oak carillon practice keyboard — a facsimile of the "real" key and pedal board in the tower — sits quietly in our second-floor choir room at JAPC. This practice instrument uses tuned metal bars instead of bronze bells for sound. They are struck when the keys and pedals are depressed and allow the player to learn new music and review pieces that might need polishing without climbing into the tower.

The practice console still has all the tiny ivory numbers (1 through 23) and note names on its keys. The carillon keys, through use and probably temperature changes in the tower, are missing several of the little discs. And the practice keyboard has special ivory plaque reading "By Royal Warrant to H. M. King George V." If the real carillon ever had one, it is no long attached.

Stop by the choir room sometime and take a look at the carillon practice key/pedal board. And if you can read music (it resembles piano music) and have an interest in learning to play the carillon, please see Stephen Warner or Jenny King. Our Gillett & Johnston carillon at JAPC was cast in Croydon, England in the mid-1920s and is the oldest and smallest carillon in Michigan.

Carillon Series welcomed Jenny HyoJin Moon

On Sunday, November 14, carillonist Jenna Moon played the second and final program in our 2021 carillon series. Her music, which began at 3:45 p.m., was a prelude to the 2021-2022 Music Series organ-piano program at half-past four.



HyoJin (Jenna) Moon earned her Doctoral degree in Sacred Music at the

University of Michigan in Ann Arbor earlier this year. An avid caril-lon ambassador of diversity, she has performed over 95 weekday carillon recitals at the Lurie and Baird carillons. Moon received the 2021 MLK spirit award and was co-recipient of 2020 Sonic Scenographies research grant. Moon received the EXCEL Enterprise Fund for her project, highlighting Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion through featuring works by composers of color. At U of M, she studied organ performance and organ literature with Dr. James Kibbie, sacred music and hymn improvisation with Dr. Kola Owolabi, and carillon performance with Dr. Tiffany Ng and Dr. Pamela Ruiter-Feenstra.

The Carillon Series at JAPC debued in 1994 as the Summer Carillon Series. Our season now extends into the fall months. John Widmann of Frederick, Md., opened the '21 series July 24 at the **Thank You Picnic** for participants in our Friday community food program.
